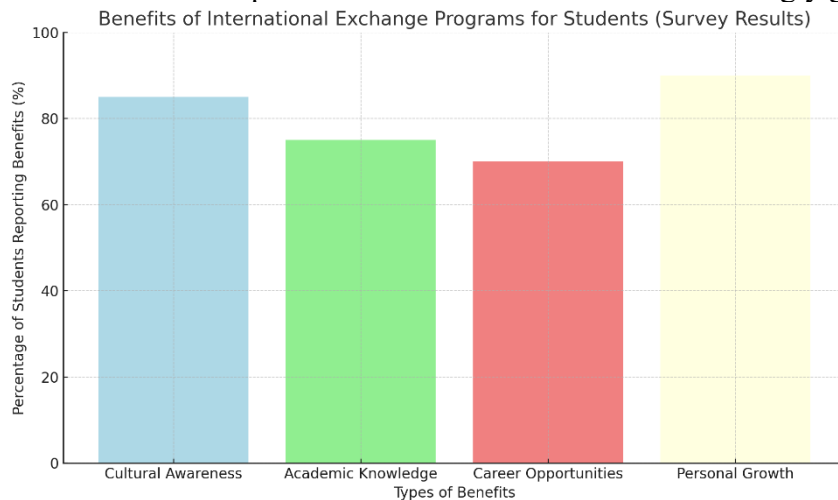
### **Creating Post-Exchange Support Systems to Ensure Continued Personal and Academic Growth**

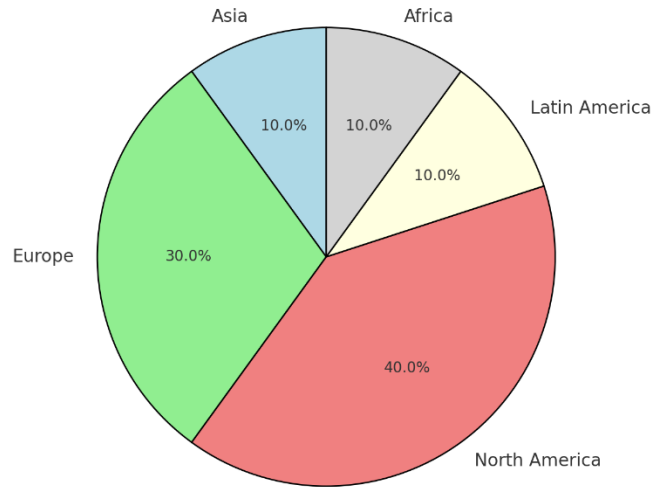
**Graph 1: Benefits of International Exchange Programs for Students (Survey Results)**
